Student Information

Modular Studies:

To enhance student life at Sword Deaf Baptist College, we do our best to minimize down time, and maximize productivity for our students. We provide classroom instruction designed in study modules or block studies. These units are given in two and three week increments, which allow full, and part-time students, optimum flexibility in selecting courses they will attend, as well as provide opportunities for off-campus employment and extra-curricular activities.

Campus Living:

At Sword Deaf Baptist College single students live in school a designated dormitory, "home away from home", that provides a great living experience and wonderful learning opportunity. Students learn to master the art of cooperation and relationship building, through peer-to-peer support and encouragement. These facilities provide an economic advantage for our students by helping reduce the overall costs of education.

All full-time students under 25 years of age are required to reside in the college dormitory unless they are residing with immediate family. The school will on availability basis make housing available for married couples.

All residents must comply with all rules and regulations of the Student Handbook, and are subject to any and all dormitory authorities.

The school is in a constant process of upgrading and adding to the school's facilities. Inquire for up dated construction information.

Spiritual Life:

At Sword Deaf Baptist College our primary concern is the growth, and spiritual well being, of our students. Students meet daily for group devotion and prayer time; and are encouraged by various veteran missionaries and pastors as they come to teach Bible courses, and preach at Chapel Services. There are a variety of spiritual activities available to students; all of which help provide the foundation needed to successfully prepare for a life of service to the Lord.

Campus Church:

Sword Deaf Baptist Church is an Independent Fundamental Baptist Church that provides students with a stable, caring, environment. Here students can continue to grow spiritually and as they get involved with the church family, and various other church activities such as: Sunday school; missionary support; weekly visitations; choir; drama; and more. Students transferring to the area, who do not have a designated church in their hometown, are required to join, and attend church services on Sunday, and on Thursday evenings. Students coming from churches of like faith and practice outside of the Knoxville area may keep membership at their home churches and fulfill their Christian obligation there. One important goal of Sword Deaf Baptist College is to impart enthusiasm and commitment to the local church.

Campus Chapel:

College chapel meets once a week on Tuesday. Each semester, missionaries, evangelists, and deaf pastors from across the country, and around the world, visit our campus. These services are a great encouragement to our students as they provide a powerful testimony, and a 'can do' attitude, for our deaf students.

All full time students are required to attend Chapel as part of their Christian service responsibilities. Part time students are required to attend chapel on days their classes meet.

Christian Service:

Christian Service is the focal point of all education provided at Sword Deaf Baptist College. We believe God has given spiritual gifts to each of our students, and that each student should focus on discovering, and nurturing these gifts, using them in service to the Lord, and to the community. For that reason, we provide various Christian service opportunities for our students, such as: weekly visitation; hospital or nursing home visitation; choir; organizing youth activities; teaching Sunday School; involvement in drama; home and church repairs; tutoring; and opportunities to preach, for male students only.

All students are required to participate in activities sponsored by the church and college. If the student's grade point average is acceptable, and they are interested, they may participate in additional activities, as they are available. These activities are under the direction of the administration and staff.

Social Life:

Sword Deaf Choir:

Students attending Sword Deaf Baptist College have the opportunity to participate in the **Sword Deaf Hands Ensemble**, and may use this activity as part of their Christian service responsibility. The choir performs at Chapel and Church services, as well as traveling to other churches and colleges, to encourage and gain support of the outside community. This is an unusual opportunity for the Deaf students to minister to the hearing community. As a result, students are lifted up and are able to develop a positive 'can do' attitude. Additional deaf choir opportunities are offered by the **Sword Deaf Baptist Church Hands of Praise Choir**.

Drama Activities:

The school's drama group performs one to two productions a year. The group has performed "A Deaf Christmas Carol", and "The Easter Pageant", "Heaven or Hell" and other productions.

Missionary Trips:

During breaks in the school year, students are at times giving the opportunity to get involved in a special ministry effort such as: mission trips or special camp functions giving them practical field experience in off campus Christian service.

Automobiles:

Automobiles are permitted for all students with a valid drivers license recognized by the state of Tennessee. Proof of insurance and registration are required by State of Tennessee. Students are <u>not permitted</u> to work on automobiles in dormitory parking lots or church parking lot without special permission from the Administrator.

Counseling:

Counseling is provided to students as necessary via the Dean of Students, for academic issues, or via the Dean of Men, and/or Dean of Women Students for spiritual and personal matters. Students have ready access to the church's pastor. We will do our bests to meet the needs of the students, but please note, we do not have trained psychologists on staff at the college. In cases where a students needs cannot be met, referral can be made to a local, professional counselor, after consent has been obtained.

Library:

Sword College provides an on-campus library of over 8,000 books, as well as off campus site, and on-line library facilities. These additional services may be used after setup by the staff or college administration.

Academic Information

Admissions Qualifications:

At Sword Deaf Baptist College we believe the most important qualification requirement for a potential student is his or her spiritual rebirth, and his or her Faith in Jesus Christ. Any student applying for admission should possess a strong faith, a desire to learn, and a desire to serve Christ by following Him in their everyday life. Each applicant is asked to submit his or her testimony, along with a statement of intent, and a request, as needed, for all special needs.

As indicated by the application for registration, potential students must provide three personal references. This form can be found on the website listed above. References are required, unless otherwise approved by the administration.

Prospective students may apply to Sword Deaf Baptist College at any time. The school's a modular study system allows the school to accept qualified students at the beginning of any two-week period, during any semester.

Although there is no deadline, we advise you apply early while class space is still available, and to maximize your learning opportunities.

To be accepted as a student at Sword Deaf Baptist College, applicants must either have graduated from high school, or successfully completed a high school equivalency test (GED), before the start of the semester. Transcripts for ACT or SAT scores should be included with the Application for Admission. Students applying for admission to the Purpose Program may include these transcripts if they are available, but are not required to do so. Applicants must be 18 years of age to register without the signature of a parent or guardian.

Admission Requirements:

With the administration's permission, student whose studies have been interrupted for more than one academic term, are eligible to re-enroll without completing a new application for admission.

Students who have been dismissed or who have left under negative circumstances may directly request permission for readmission from the college administration. Each individual request is handled on a case-by-case basis and acceptance is not guaranteed. All students who return after a dismissal are required to meet the course requirements of their intended program, without exception.

All full-time students must select a major course of study at time of enrollment. Part-time students, and those taking classes for personal interest, may register for courses at any time prior to the first day of class. These students may also attend classes without selecting a major course of study.

Attendance Information:

All students are expected to attend scheduled classes, chapel and church services, and activities. Excused absences will be given on a limited basis. Each case will be reviewed and decided using requirements outlined in the student handbook.

Sword College offers a block study program to help students best manage their time, activities, and work schedules. Students who wish to drop a course may do so after the third class by formally notifying the Office of Registrar. Students who fail to provide written notification of such intent will be obligated to meet the financial requirement of the course for which they are registered. The student's financial responsibility includes course tuition and any applicable fees.

If one chooses to withdraw from a course of study, the student will receive a grade of to indicate he or she had withdrawn.

Course Cancellation:

In the event that there are not enough students registered to teach a scheduled course, students may request a tuition refund; otherwise, for all diploma-seeking student, tuition will be held and either used as payment on an existing account, or as payment for the next class scheduled. Courses maybe individually tutored.

Unfortunately, there are cases when last minute changes must be made. Due to this fact, class schedules are subject to change at any time. Whenever possible, college administration will attempt to notify students of changes in advance.

Academic Advisement:

Academic advisors are available from the time the applicant submits his or her initial application. The initial role of the academic advisor is to guide the student in choosing a major course of study, or to answer any question you may have regarding offered courses. If you are unsure of your course selection, contact the Office of Academic Dean and schedule a meeting to discuss a plan for the upcoming semester.

Academic Tutoring:

Tutoring is provided for students whose grade point average is 2.0 or below. Each case is considered on its own merits and a student is assigned a tutor to work closely with him or her at our on-campus facility. A student may obtain assistance by contacting the Office of Academic Dean and making a request, or at the request of a staff member, or a course instructor.

A student whose GPA is above 3.0 may receive academic assistance by making arrangements with students, friends, and staff who can help in their spare time; or at the request of a staff member, or an instructor. Tutoring is not guaranteed for students with a GPA above 3.0 – with the exception of requests made by the administration.

Class Standing:

Students are classified into groups according to the number of credit hours completed. This is typically called a class standing. These groups are categorized as follows:

<u>Freshman</u> –

A student who has satisfied entrance requirements and has completed less than 30 credit hours of study.

<u>Sophomore</u> –

A student in good standing who has completed more than 29 but less than 60 credit hours of study.

<u>Junior</u> –

A student in good standing who has completed more than 59 but less than 94 hours of study.

<u>Senior</u> –

A student in good standing who has completed at least 90 hours of study.

Academic Records:

Students may request copies of academic records, transcripts by contacting the administration office and completing a written request for information. The student's request should include their name, address, birth-date, social security number, date of request, dates of attendance, mail to address, and original signature.

Unless otherwise approved by the administration office, the records department will not release records until the student's account is paid in full.

ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

Grades will be issued at mid-term, and they will be given individually to students in class. These include daily work, papers, tests, and final exams. Mid-term grades are intended as a guide to the student, as to his or her own progress, and are not entered into the student's permanent record.

Credits are awarded on a semester hour basis. One semester hour of credit represents a total of 12 to 14 clock hours of instruction or class time.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

The previous outline is an overview of courses offered, along with the required credit hours for each division of study. The courses listed are common to all majors, but indicate required courses per major as well.

Sword Deaf Baptist College will award a Bachelor of Arts with Proficiency in Pastoral Studies, Mission Studies, Christian Education Studies, or an American Sign Language Interpreting Degree, to those students who have successfully complete the required four-year course study outlined for their designated major field of study, have a total GPA of 2.0 or above, and have settled any and all outstanding financial obligations to SDBC.

Final exams will be given in each class and any student that misses his or her final exam must request a special make-up exam. If the appeal is denied, the student's grade will remain zero and become a part of the student's permanent records. All scheduling problems should be handled by contacting the Office of Academic Dean.

Students are expected to attend graduation services but, if the student has an urgent need, he or she may request an exception by contacting the Office of Academic Dean. Each case is judged on its own merits and an exception is not guaranteed. If the request is approved, the student may graduate absentia.

Financial Information

The registration of a student signifies an agreement by that student to fulfill the related financial obligations through the end of the semester in which he is registered. The College expects that every student will care for his or her own account. The College takes the position that it is a part of the education of the students to allow them the responsibility of handling their own financial commitments.

Application Fee: A non-refundable application fee of \$100.00 must accompany each application for admission.

Books:

The cost of books and supplies will vary depending upon hours attempted, cost of each textbook, etc. An estimated range would be from \$100.00 to \$250.00 per <u>semester</u>.

All charges are due and payable upon registration of each semester. ** <u>No refunds will be given</u> unless course if officially dropped before the second day of school.



DEAF MISSIONS MAJOR

Degree Offered: Graduate of Deaf Pastoral Major

Hours Required: 124

The Deaf Missions Major is designed to equip students for a life of ministry and service to the Deaf community, wherever the Lord may lead them, across cultural boundaries. Our focus is to provide students with the insight needed to understand the tasks, and the life of a missionary, as well as to prepare them for deputation, applying to a mission board, and life in the mission field.

In the Bible Studies Division, Deaf Mission Major our goal is to be a part of the great commission in reaching the virtually untouched mission field of the more then 300,000,000 deaf and hard of hearing in the world today. Most classes are lead by seasoned missionaries who are excited to share their experiences, and to successfully guide students into the mission field. Course Descriptions

The following section includes the description of the courses offered at Sword Deaf Bible College. Each course is listed alphabetically; by category and course number. Each listing includes course number, title, credit hours, description, and pre-requisites.

COURSE DESCRIPTION KEY

A combination of two letters and three numbers identifies each individual course (ex: BI 101). The first two letters of the of the course number identify the category of study:

BI – Biblical Studies, CE – Christian Education, EN – English, HI – History, MI – Missions, PC – Pastor Care, PS – Psychology, SL – Sign Language

The combination of three numbers indicates the association between the course description, and the year of study:

Courses listed in the 100 series are typically taken in the Freshman year of study, but may be taken at another time if all pre-requisites have been satisfied. Courses in the 200 series can be taken in the Sophomore, Junior, or Senior year of study; courses in the 300 series are typically considered Junior year courses of study, but can be taken at other times; 400 series courses are Senior level courses and may be taken at another time if indicated in the course description, or by the administration.

Where applicable, course pre-requisites are indicated in the course description. Exceptions are handled at the digression of the staff and administration.

Bible Major

BI 100 Introduction to Bible Study

Course is an overview of the Holy Bible discussing its make up, heritage, inspiration and method of delivery from original writings to the present day.

BI 101 Old Testament Survey I (3)

Course surveying the Bible's Old Testament giving an overview of the volume's contents. This course is designed to give the student general knowledge upon which Future Old Testament studies will be based.

BI 111 Life of Christ (3)

Course surveying the Bible's Old Testament giving an overview of the volume's contents. This course is designed to give the student general knowledge upon which Future Old Testament studies will be based.

BI 102 New Testament Survey (3)

Course surveying the Bible's New Testament giving an overview of the volume's contents. This course is designed to give the student general knowledge upon which future New Testament Studies will be based

BI 110 Evangelism

A study of biblical principles of evangelism. Teaching principles and methods of Soul Winning. Includes memorization of Bible verses.

BI 221 Bible Doctrines (3)

A systemic study of major doctrines of the Bible consisting of the basic tenets of fundamental biblical beliefs.

BI402 Revelation (3)

Chapter by Chapter study of the Bible's book of Revelation. Intensive analysis of prophetic events and their timing in relation to other books of prophecy.

BI401 General Epistles (2)

Verse by verse studies of James, I and II Peter, I, II, III John and Jude with emphasis on their background, doctrinal teachings and application to the Christian life.

BI 204 Synoptic Gospels (3)

A study of Matthew, Mark, and Luke as they relate to the life and ministry of Jesus from his incarnation to His ascension.

BI206 Acts of the Apostles (3)

Chapter by Chapter study of the Acts of the Apostles in the Holy Bible. This is a study of the introduction of the church as we understand it to day and its early development in ministry to the Jewish and Gentile world.

BI405 Hermeneutics (3)

Principles of Biblical interpretation emphasizing the value of using the Bible's comments on itself.

BI305 Eschatology (3)

Study of future things as prophesied by the prophets of the Old and New Testament of the Holy Bible.

BI 431 Jonah (3)

A systemic theology study of major doctrines of the Bible consisting of the basic tenets of fundamental biblical beliefs.

BI 441 Genesis (2)

A systemic theology study of major doctrines of the Bible consisting of the basic tenets of fundamental biblical beliefs.

BI 442 Romans (3)

Chapter by Chapter study of the Bible's book of Romans. Intensive analysis of the relationship between Bible law and the Bible principle of salvation by grace.

BI306 Premillennalism (2)

Detailed study of the doctrine of Premillennalism as taught in the Holy Bible. Study considers the importance of the Abrahamic Covenant in the doctrine of Premillennalism.

BI402 Epistles of Paul (3)

Study of the letters written by the Apostle Paul to the churches as recorded in the Holy Bible. Emphasis is placed on their historical importance, doctrinal teachings and application to Christian living.

BI304 Apologetics (3)

Study of the philosophical and logical arguments for Christian beliefs as taught in the Holy Bible which is the sole basis for he principles of Fundamental Christian Doctrine.

Foreign Languages

FL405 Hebrew I (3)

A study of basic elements of Hebrew grammar and reading with emphasis on syntax, forms, and vocabulary designed to give a working knowledge f the Hebrew Old Testament.

FL305 Greek I (3)

A study of the basic elements of Greek grammar and reading with emphasis on syntax, forms, and a vocabulary designed to give a working knowledge of the Greek New Testament.

FL201 Mexican Sign Language I (3)

Study of basic 1,000 word vocabulary of LSM as used in Mexico City, DF, Mexico. Study includes much expressive usage of the language by the student.

FL202 Mexican Sign Language II (3)

Study of usage of LSM vocabulary with the use of a Spanish Thesaurus of the Mexican Sign Language expanding the basic 1,000 word vocabulary to a 10,000 word vocabulary.

FL203 Brazil Sign Language I (3)

Study of basic 1,000 word vocabulary of LSB as used in Sao Paulo, SP, Brazil. Study includes much expressive usage of the language by the student

FL204 Brazil Sign Language II (3)

Study of usage of LSB vocabulary with the use of a Portuguese Thesaurus of the Brazilian Sign Language expanding the basic 1,000 word vocabulary to a 10,000 word vocabulary.

Christian Education

CE 301 Introduction to Christian Education (2)

Study of various church ministries with children and young people. Special emphasis in this course is placed on programs for deaf and hard of hearing children and the various problems of communications.

CE 302 Teaching Children (2)

Study of various church ministries with children and young people. Special emphasis in this course is placed on programs for deaf and hard of hearing children and the various problems of communications.

CE 304 Teaching Aids (2)

Study of various tools available in teaching both youth and adults in both educational and church settings. Attention is paid to computer graphics, computer presentation, physical visual aids, etc.

CE303 Church Finance (3)

Study of the cost and fund handling of building and operating a church. Consideration is given to property acquirement, construction, church budgeting and funding of church ministry.

CE306 Church Organization (3)

Analysis of the organizing and operating of a church. Organization of departmental systems for churches is considered.

CE307 Establishing a Deaf Ministry (3)

Course discussing the various aspects of establishing a deaf ministry within a church and the building of a deaf church.

CE412 Personal Finance (2)

Study of personal finance and accounting for pastors and ministers. Practical training offered on budgeting, banking and financial matters.

CE403 Church Publications (2)

Study of publishing as an important of church ministry from advertising to public announcements and news paper articles.

CE405 Christian Home (3)

Study of Biblical principles of the Christian home; including courtship, marriage, family roles, parenting and questions influencing the modern Christian home.

PC 401 World Religions and Cults (3)

Study of world religions and common cults. Analysis is studied of their basic premises and main teachings as the basis of their distinctive doctrines.

PC 402 Establishing a Deaf Ministry (3)

Study of the methods and skills required for building a ministry to deaf people in local churches and the principles and procedures of establishing deaf churches.

Pastoral Studies

PS404Pastoral Counseling(3)Study of a pastor's responsibilities to the Nourthetic
counseling of those attending the pastor's church ministry.

PS410 Pastoral Internship (6)

Practical experience working within a Deaf Church ministry under the leadership of an experienced pastor.

PS420 Internship Analysis Thesis (3)

Student prepared paper on the Pastoral Internship discussing the various aspects of the work experience and analysis of the goals and day to day operations of church ministry.

PS304 Survey of Missions (3)

Study of the modern missionary movement with an veteran missionary professor. Aspects of indigenous missions and mission funding provided from the American mission movement are considered. The performance of national and foreign missionaries is considered.

PS404 Technology in Church Ministry (3)

Introduction to modern technological methods and equipment usable in the modern church. Study of equipment, methods and basic technological equipment usage is included.

PS410 Camp Administration

Study of modern camping for youth and adults as applied to the local church. Course includes practical on site camping experience in a professional camping situation.

CE 102 Discipleship (2)

Study of the methods and skills required for personal evangelism. This course includes study of the Biblical message of the Gospel of Christ and its presentation in personal soul winning. This course is required for all students of the school.

CE 121 Etiquette (2)

Study of socially acceptable actions of personality, interpersonal relationships, social activities. Course includes tips on personal grooming, social graces and relationships with others.

CE 122 Christian Development (2)

Study of the methods and skills required for personal evangelism.

CE 301 Church Administration (2)

Detailed study of principles of church administrative responsibilities and skills. In this course attention is particularly paid to the organization and business matters of the church. Study of practical pastoral responsibilities within the church. Attention is given to such matters as baptism, funerals, weddings, types of special ministries and church activities.

CE 302 Pastoral Theology (2)

Study of the principles, theology and methods used in pastoring a local church. Course includes studies of practical pastoring skills and responsibilities.

CE 322 Ethics (3)

Study of the principles of conduct of a Christian Service Professional. Emphasis is placed on the ethical conduct both actual and perceived of those serving in full time Gospel service.

CE 410 Pstoral Internship (10)

On site training in a local church or church deaf ministry for Pastoral candidates. Student must keep a daily journal and write a thesis about the internship.

English

EN 101 English Grammar I (3)

Study or parts of speech, sentence structure and language building in the English language.

EN 102 English Grammar II (3)

Comprehensive study of the sentence structure, mechanics of writing and principles of elementary composition.

EN 201 Reading & Word Study I (2)

Course designed to help students in the building of English vocabulary and understanding of using English.

EN 202 Reading & Word Study II (2)

Course designed to help students in the building of their reading skills in the English language. Vocabulary development is an important part of this course.

En 301 English Literature

A comprehensive study of English Literature from its beginning to the present with emphasis on major writers.

EN 302 American Literature

A study of literature texts written in about America from its founding as a nation to the present.

EN 310 Public Speaking

Course designed to help students in the delivery of a public speech. Concentration is given on the building and delivery of publish speeches.

Mission Studies

MI 201 Bible Principle of Missions (3)

Study of Biblical teachings on evangelism and foreign missions as related to the modern missionary movement.

MI202 Cross Cultural Missions (3)

Study of aspects to be considered by a missionary working with a culture of people different than his own. Study of foreign missionary experiences is an important part of this training.

MI301 Indigenous principles in Missions (3) Study of possibilities and methods of building indigenous missionary programs which will propitiate the growth of the missionary movement. Internationally emphasizing the training of nationals to minister to their people.

MI302 Starting a new Church (3)

Comprehensive look at the multiplicity of factors to be put together in the building of a new local church. Consideration to beginning, construction, organization and growth are considered.

MI303 Basic Construction (3)

Overview of basic construction principles, processes and equipment designed for the modern foreign missionary and deaf pastor who may be involved in the building of buildings internationally for their ministries in the future.

MI304 Basic Auto Mechanics (3)

Overview of basic automobile mechanics looking at basic maintenance, automotive systems and trouble shooting designed for the foreign missionary who may find a situation with limited automotive services available on the foreign field.

MI401 Basic Electricity

Look at basic building wiring and electrical systems as well as appliances for the foreign missionary.

MI402 Mission Sociology (2)

A look at modern cross cultural missions and consideration of the questions related to the ethnic implications of the missionary movement. What is taught as Biblical truth and what is ethnic preference is a serious consideration in missions

MI410 Mission Trip (4)

Mission majors are required to take one actual foreign mission trip into another country where they will experience actual missionary work and write a paper analyzing their experience.

MI420 Mission Internship (6)

Mission majors are required to work on a defined and approved mission field before their graduation as part of a performing mission team with responsibility to the building of the work in which they are working. A written analysis of the experience is part of completion of the course.

Arts

AR 201 Drama (3)

Study of drama techniques with the practical application of actually putting together and performing of dramatic programing to the general public.

AR 202 Music (3)

Study of principles of music as applied to deaf people and audiences of both hearing and deaf attendees. Course includes practical experience performing for the general public in a choir composed of primarily deaf students and professionals.

Social Studies

HI 201 History of Civilization (3)

Global study of the development of man and civilizations from creation to modern times. Consideration is given to Biblical history compared to the context of the development of nations and nation states throughout history.

HI 202 American History (3)

Study of the development of the new world and the establishing of the United States and its development through the years.

HI 302 Baptist History (2)

A comprehensive study of Baptist and their development from the revelation of the church in the Bible's Book of Act to present times.

Church History (3)

Study of the development of the church through world history from its revelation in the Bible's Book of Acts to present times.

PS 102 General Psychology (3)

Study of various church ministries with children and young people. Special emphasis in this course is placed on programs for deaf and hard of hearing children and the various problems of communications.

PS 311 Marriage and Family (3)

Study of various church ministries with children and young people. Special emphasis in this course is placed on programs for deaf and hard of hearing children and the various problems of communications.

PS 401 Counseling (2)

Study of modern day counseling techniques using the methods of Nourthetic counseling from the Holy Bible.

Mathematics

MA101 College Algebra (3)

Study of basic mathematical algebraic equations methods and principles.

MA 102 Geometry (3)

Study of the basic principles and methods of Geometry and their practical applications.

Science

SI201 Physical Science (3)

An introductory study of the sciences of astronomy, geology, meteorology, physics, chemistry and space science. Includes lab work.

SI202 Zoology (3)

An introductory study of the animal kingdom its make up and development from a creationist point of view.

ASL Interpreter

SL 100 Fingerspelling (2)

Introduction to the American Sign Language system of finger spelling. Study includes American manual alphabet, manual number systems, whole word spelling and receptive skills.

SL 101 American Sign Language I (4)

Introduction to American Sign Language vocabulary and expressions. ASL syntax and Deaf culture will be studied. Concepts of gestured language expressions such as spacial referencing, contrastive structure, and body language will be studied.

SL 102 American Sign Language II (4)

Extended development of conversational ASL. Study of Deaf culture and community. Course identifies ASL classifiers, sequencing, special agreement, and object descriptions. Prerequisite: ASL I

SL 201 American Sign Language III (4)

Course designed to develop proficiency in use of ASL an thought development in gestures. ASL grammar, variation in sign types and sentence types, time concepts, topicalization, locative pluralization, and distribution will be studied. Strong emphasis is given to developing expressive skills. Prerequisite: ASL II

SL 202 American Sign Language IV (4)

Study of linguistic aspects of ASL and the Bilingual characteristics of the communication systems of the Deaf community. Proficiency in treceptive aspects of sign language are strongly emphasized. Prerequisite: ASL III

SL 211 Deaf Culture (3)

This course studies the particular cultural aspects of the Deaf community. Subjects include the study of the core of the Deaf community and its relationship to the community at large; cultural mores an characteristics.

SL 212 Deaf Culture II (3)

In depth studies of the Deaf community as a minority community. Subjects cover educational philosophies, legal relations, political orientations and social status in the community at large. Prerequisite: Deaf Studies

SL 301 Basics of Interpreting (4)

Introduction to the process of interpreting in ASL. Course includes interpreting subjects such as language analysis, vocabulary selection, client language assessment. Prerequisite: ASL IV and a demonstrated language proficiency in ASL.

SL 302 Expressive Interpreting (4)

Study of the art of expressing spoken English language into ASL at the appropriate level for the receiving audience. Partiuclar emphasis is placed on signing styles, language usage, and concept expressions through manual methods. Prerequisites: Basic Interpreting

SL 401 Receptive Interpreting (4)

Study of the art of reading ASL and expressing it verbally to an audience in proper English language. Emphasis placed on receiving and verbally stating various levels and types of expressions given in manual language. Emphasis is placed on transliteration of ASL particular thought patterns. Prerequisites: Expressive Interpreting

SL 402 Advanced Interpreting (4)

Study of special interpreting and vocabulary needs of particular situations. These include situations such as medical, chemical dependency, legal and educational interpreting. Prerequisites: Receptive Interpreting

SL 411 Interpreting Practicum (4)

Course designed to give students practical experience in business and various situations of professional interpreting. Shadowing is a tool to introduce beginning interpreters to the professional aspects of the field. Prerequisites: Expressive and Receptive Interpreting

SL 420

Certification Preparation (3)

Intensive advanced course designed to prepare the student for standard evaluation exam of sign language skills. Analysis of the evaluation process both local and national is considered. Focus on sharpening student skills is important to this course.
